#### Leaving Certificate Class of 2023

Colleges- SETU Waterford, SETU Carlow, UCC, UL, ATU Letterfrack, ATU Sligo, WCFE, Clonmel CTI, Tipperary ETB FET Centre

What are they studying- Agricultural Science, Engineering, Languages, Arts, Psychology, Teaching, Nursing, Computing, Sports, Journalism, Furniture Making and Design

Apprenticeships- Electrician, Metal Fabrication, Mechanical Fitting, Laboratory Analyst, Hairdresser, Blocklayer, Pipefitting, Tree Maintenance





#### PLC (QQI Level 5 & 6)

- 1-2 year course, huge variety of courses which can link you straight into employment or to further study in a College of Higher Education
- Apply online, you will then attend an interview, a place is offered and then you may have to pay a deposit to secure your place.
- 5 passes in your Leaving Cert/Pass L.C.A. is required for a place on a PLC course
- Applications are open and students can now apply through <u>www.fetchcourses.ie</u> \*need your PPS number to apply
- Courses available include Childcare, Beauty Therapy, Hairdressing, Business, Computers, Animal Care, Psychology, Social Care, Health Care/Pre-Nursing, Art and Design, Journalism, Photography, Media, Construction, Pharmacy Assistant, Sports and Leisure, Travel and Tourism



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### PLC (QQI Level 5 & 6)

#### Benefits of a PLC course

- Graduate with qualification
- 'Job Ready'
- 'Testing' a career or industry
- Work Experience
- Middle ground between school and third level
- Back door to third level



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#### Apprenticeships

- To qualify in a trade you undergo an apprenticeship which usually takes 4 years with 4 employer based training parts and 3 college based training parts.
- Currently around 20,000 apprentices- to be increased to 30,000 by 2025.
- There is a wide variety of different apprenticeships available from the traditional craft apprentices such as Carpenter/Electrician/Block Layer to newer apprenticeships in Pharma, Insurance, ICT, Accounting Technician.
- Female participation is increasing and encouraged.
- The apprentice must make sure the employer registers them with SOLAS. Employer will look for your leaving cert results before doing this.
- The qualification is internationally recognised.



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#### Apprenticeships

To find an apprenticeship:

- Talk to family members, neighbours, friends
- Show your interest in the trade you want to do
- Gain experience in the trade
- Look out for national recruitment for ESB, Bus Eireann, Irish Rail etc.
- From Easter start to contact people/ businesses expressing your interest
- Bigger companies will start to recruit from March-Laboratory Assistant/ Mechatronic Engineering

- Earn as you learn
- Graduate with internationally renowned qualification
- Balance of work and college
- Huge range of careers on offer with attractive salaries
- Equal opportunities- huge increase in female apprentices

# What is the CAO?



- The Central Applications Office (CAO) processes all applications for Colleges of Higher Education in Ireland.
- After the Leaving Certificate results in August, the CAO issues all course offers to students.
- Students accept courses through the CAO.
- Applications are made online and cost €30 up to Jan 20<sup>th</sup> and then €45 until Feb 1<sup>st</sup>.



How many courses can my son/daughter apply for through the CAO?



- Students can apply for up to 20 courses
- 10 Level 8 Honours Degree Courses
- 10 Level 7 Ordinary Degree/ Level 6 Higher Certificate Courses
- Courses must be put in order of preference!

After the closing date of Feb 1<sup>st</sup>, students can change the order of their courses or put in new non-restricted courses when the change of mind facility opens in May until July 1<sup>st</sup>.

#### Filling up choices on the CAO Form Order of Preference is the RULE!

#### What is needed for the application form?



- Personal Details: Name, date of birth, address, phone number
- Qualifications: for students sitting their Leaving Certificate only tick Irish Leaving Certificate 2024 (1<sup>st</sup> box)
- Email: do not use school email
- Payment: via debit or credit card
- Password: to create and keep safe
- School name and address
- Course choices: add Level 8 and Level 7/6 course codes
- Additional information: SUSI grant, NUI exemptions, disability or specific learning difficulty/ DARE application, HEAR application





#### How does the CAO choose who to offer a course to?

- Colleges tell the CAO how many places to offer on each course
- The CAO then checks that applicants have made the entry requirements for the course. Applicants are then put in a queue in order of their results or Leaving Certificate points.
- Some courses also add on points for portfolios/auditions etc.
- Offers go out to the applicants that make the cut
- Students will receive an offer for the highest numbered course on their application where they made the cut
- Students can receive a maximum of 2 offers-

1 Level 8 and 1 Level 7/6





### What happens in August?

- CAO offers come out a few days after the Leaving Cert results
- Students will receive a maximum of 2 offers- 1 Level 8 Offer and 1 Level 7/6 Offer
- Students can accept 1 offer
- If accepting an offer, they must do so by the reply date on the offer notice
- If you are not accepting an offer, ignore it





#### **Researching Courses**

- Keep an open mind- write down the name of any course on a college website/prospectus that sounds vaguely interesting and look into it.
- Use Careersportal to find similar courses in different colleges.
- Look at courses that involve your favourite school subject and general interests.
- Do look at the subjects/modules you will study on the course.
- Do not be put off by a couple of subjects you don't like.
- Put courses in genuine order of preference.
- Have a variety of courses including aspirational, realistic and safety net.
- There is no such thing as the 'perfect course' but there are courses out there that you are most suited to

## What is HEAR?

The **Higher Education Access Route** is an admissions route for school leavers who for **social**, **financial or cultural** reasons are **under-represented** in **third level education**.

It was set up to ensure that all Leaving Certificate students have a fair and equal opportunity to progress to third level education.



## Why apply to HEAR?

 Reduced points CAO offers in the participating colleges provided you meet the minimum entry requirements.

Post-entry supports such as financial, academic, social and personal.



## Should I apply?

#### **HEAR Indicators**

#### 1. Was your household income on or below €46,790 in 2022?

- 2. Do you or your family have a Medical Card/GP Visit Card?
- Did your parents/guardians receive a means-tested social welfare payment for at least 26 weeks in 2022?
- 4. Is your parents' or guardians' employment status under-represented in Higher Education?
- 5. Have you attended a **DEIS** second level school for five years?
- 6. Do you live in an **area** of concentrated disadvantage?



## What is DARE?

The **Disability Access Route to Education (DARE)** is a third level alternative admissions scheme for school-leavers whose disabilities have had a negative impact on their second level education.

DARE offers reduced points places to school leavers who as a result of having a disability have experienced additional educational challenges in second level education.



## Disabilities eligible for consideration

- Autistic Spectrum Disorder (including Asperger's Syndrome)
- ADD/ADHD
- Blind/Vision Impaired
- Deaf/Hard of Hearing
- DCD Dyspraxia
- Dyslexia/Significant Literacy Difficulties
- Dyscalculia/Significant Numeracy Difficulties
- Mental Health Condition
- Neurological Condition (Incl. Brain Injury & Epilepsy)
- Physical Disability
- Speech & Language Communication Disorder
- Significant Ongoing Illness





- Students can apply for a SUSI grant if they are doing a CAO or a PLC course
- Grant applications will open April 2024
- In order to be eligible for a grant your household income needs to meet certain criteria
- The amount the student receives depends on the household income and if the college is above or below 30km from the household address
- Top tips:
  - Organise all tax/income documentation early in 2024
  - Use the 'eligibility reckoner' on www.susi.ie to get an indication of whether the student is eligible
  - Deadlines are important
  - Instructional videos on the website are excellent



- To receive a full 100% rate the household income for 2022 must be less than €40,875 (income bands increase with dependent children)
- The student will receive €1,702.43 per academic year if they live within 30 km of the college
- The student will receive €4,018.69 per academic year if they live over 30 km of the college
- The student will also receive the €3,000 student contribution



➤Where the Household Income is less than €25,000 and includes an eligible long-term Department of Social Protection Payment (list of eligible payments found on <u>www.susi.ie-</u> includes payments such as One Parent Family payment, Disability, Carers Allowance)

➤You may be eligible for the Special Rate of Maintenance.

- The student will receive €3,099.33 per academic year if they live within 30 km of the college
- The student will receive €7,312.69 per academic year if they live over 30 km of the college

The amount a student receives depends on household income up to €100,000. For example, a household income of less than €50,840 will receive the full student contribution fee.

# SUSI

#### Financial Assistance /Grants-SUSI

- Means tested -Parents income- Tax year 2022
- Register SUSI April 2024
- Student needs to disclose if they have a part-time job
- If the part-time job is within school holidays they can earn up to €6,552 without it being counted as 'household income'
- Must /can reapply each year as family circumstances may change.

- Grant for 1 PLC and one 1<sup>st</sup> year, 2<sup>nd</sup> year, 3<sup>rd</sup> year, 4<sup>th</sup> year on a CAO course
- Students can drop out by 31<sup>st</sup>
  October if unhappy in their course. A full refund will be given of the student contribution.
- SUSI will have to be informed
- Organise tax documents early



#### **Final Thoughts**

- The Leaving Certificate is a difficult year. Motivation and perspective are key.
- A regular study plan needs to start early to avoid unnecessary stress and to achieve potential.
- Having a supportive parent/guardian is really helpful in keeping them motivated and keeping stress at bay.
- Encourage them to do the work now, not leave things to the last minute
- Encourage them to talk to you/guidance counsellor/teacher if they are feeling stressed or confused.
- Course research is essential and is their responsibility- focus on the subjects they will study in each year not just the course title!
- Deadlines are strict and are the students' responsibility.
- Students should have a Plan A, B & C!
